GUIDING LEGAL ELEMENTS (GLEs)

The Guiding Legal Elements for forest management, timber production and trade have been developed by FAO through consultations with a technical working group —pooling expertise from international organizations, research institutions, academia, civil society and the private sector — and further refined via a public online discussion to collect input from a broad range of stakeholders.

Thirty-one GLEs have been identified and grouped in four Clusters to capture the different stages of the timber value chain:

- 1. Land Tenure and Forest Management
- 2. <u>Harvesting Activities</u>
- 3. Processing, Transport and Trade
- 4. Taxes and Fees
