



AN ACT TO AMEND SUBSECTION 40120(f)(3) OF CHAPTER 40 OF TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED; TO ADD §11106(d) AND TO AMEND §11107 OF CHAPTER 11, DIVISION 2 OF TITLE 8 OF THE GUAM ADMINISTRATIVE RULES AND REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO REDUCING THE PRICE OF EGGS BY REMOVING THE INDIVIDUAL EGG STAMPING REQUIREMENT OF IMPORTED EGGS THAT MEET LOCAL AND UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*
3 finds that much legislation has been enacted to regulate the sale of shell eggs.

1 The laws apply to the edibility of the product and to its quality and grade.
2 Both Federal and State laws are applicable to eggs, but practically most of
3 those pertaining to grading have been enacted by the States.

4 The Egg Products Inspection Act (EPIA) (United States Public Law 91-
5 597), which became law in 1970, provides for the uniformity of standards and
6 grades. The Act states: "For eggs which have moved or are moving in
7 interstate or foreign commerce, no State or local jurisdiction may require the
8 use of standards of quality, condition, weight, quantity, or grade which are in
9 addition to or different from the official Federal standards." This has
10 prompted States with egg laws in which the standards and grades differ
11 somewhat from the official Federal standards and grades to amend their laws
12 to comply with the Federal standards. A provision on labeling prohibits
13 States from requiring labeling on eggs from other areas to indicate the State or
14 other geographic area of production or origin. This provision does not apply
15 to Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Guam or the Virgin Islands. However, Guam
16 is the only U.S. jurisdiction that requires individual egg stamp labeling.

17 Guam's administrative rules require that the origin of the eggs must be
18 stamped on each egg. As the only U.S. domestic jurisdiction with this
19 requirement, egg producers apply an added cost that inevitably is borne by
20 the consumers of Guam. As much as ten percent (10%) of the freight on board
21 (FOB) cost is added to the packaged product cost. The existing stamping
22 requirement has no added benefit for the consumers of Guam. The Federal
23 Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, and the regulations for its enforcement, apply
24 to all food products in interstate commerce, including shell eggs. This Act is
25 designed to prevent the shipment of adulterated and misbranded foods.

1 Additionally, the Federal Trade Commission has responsibility for regulating
2 the business practices engaged in by firms marketing eggs in interstate or
3 foreign commerce. Therefore, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that the removal of
4 Guam's egg stamping policies will benefit the people of Guam by reducing
5 the cost of imported egg products.

6 **Section 2. Subsection 11106(d) is hereby *added* to Chapter 11,**
7 **Division 2 of Title 8 of the Guam Administrative Rules and Regulations to**
8 **read:**

9 " (d) In the case of eggs imported from mainland United States or
10 foreign countries, regardless of the person producing the same,
11 imported eggs shall be marked by the importer on each carton or other
12 type of container or package of eggs as required by 5 GCA Chapter 66,
13 the *Chicken Egg Regulation*."

14 **Section 3. Section 11107 of Chapter 11, Division 2 of Title 8 of the**
15 **Guam Administrative Rules and Regulations is *amended* to read:**

16 "§11107. **Notice of Grade and Size; Designation of Origin of**
17 **Imported Eggs. (a)** It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, or offer
18 to sell or expose for sale to a consumer, any eggs other than those of his
19 own production intended for human consumption without notifying by
20 suitable sign or label the person purchasing or intending to purchase the
21 same whether the same are imported from the mainland United States
22 or foreign countries or of local production, and the exact grade or
23 quality and size or weight and date such eggs were graded.

24 (b) The word 'local' shall be used to designate eggs produced in
25 Guam.

1 (c) Anybody importing eggs into Guam for sale shall obtain a
2 permit from the Department of Agriculture, stating the country of
3 origin, the volume of eggs to be imported and other pertinent data as
4 may be prescribed by the Department in compliance with 5 GCA
5 Chapter 66, the *Chicken Egg Regulation*."

6 **Section 4. Subsection 40120(f)(3) of Chapter 40 of Title 10 of the**
7 **Guam Code Annotated is amended to read:**

8 “(3) Notwithstanding any provision of law, all fresh or frozen
9 packaged meat, fresh eggs, bread, fresh milk and fresh daily products
10 and ice cream, and such other food, drug and consumer commodity
11 designated by the Director of the Department of Public Health and
12 Social Services shall have a clearly designated expiration date on each
13 package offered for retail sale. Notwithstanding any other provision of
14 law, in lieu of stamping any required labels whatsoever on individual
15 eggs, such information may instead be stamped on each egg carton if
16 the eggs are packed in individual cartons of twelve (12) eggs or less as
17 required by 5 GCA Chapter 66, the *Chicken Egg Regulation*."

18 **Section 5. Severability.** *If any provision of this Act or its application*
19 *to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such*
20 *invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Act which*
21 *can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this*
22 *end the provisions of this Act are severable.*






(b) The word local shall be used to designate eggs produced in the ~~Territory of~~ Guam.

~~any dock or landing until the consignee thereof has been furnished with a certificate issued by the Department certifying that the eggs contained in the shipment in which such eggs arrived are marked as provided in this Section.~~

~~(cd)~~ Anybody importing eggs into the Territory Guam for sale shall obtain a permit from the Department of Agriculture, stating the country of origin, the volume of eggs to be imported and other pertinent data as may be prescribed by the Department in compliance with 5 GCA Chapter 66, the *Chicken Egg Regulation*.

Section 4. Subsection 40120(f)(3) of Chapter 40 of Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is amended to read:

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on General and Omnibus Matters held a public hearing at 9 a.m., Friday, March 18, 2005 in the Session Hall, I Liheslaturan Guåhan. Public notice was submitted to all media (see facsimile poll/activity report attachment) on Friday, March 11, 2005 and confirmed received. A print ad of the Public Notice was printed in the March 15, 2005, edition of the Pacific Daily News (PDN), posted in the Government Meetings Section in the March 17 edition of the PDN. A second submittal of public notice to all media was done on March 16, 2005 (see facsimile poll/activity report attachment).

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

There were no Individuals who attended the public hearing on Bill 54 to present testimony.

Mr. M. Thomas Nadeau of the Department of Public Health and Social Services, submitted written testimony in favor of Bill 54. He writes the only concern the Department of Public Health and Social Services has is related to the issuance of a sanitary permit and requirements on safe handling and storage guidelines for shelled eggs.

Comments by the Author;

Senator Jesse Lujan spoke on the intent of the bill. He said that the legislation is needed to update an archaic law regulating the stamping of eggs. He said that Guam is the only island that requires the individual stamping of eggs and that currently most U.S. States have adopted regulations allowing for eggs to be stamped by carton.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on General and Omnibus Matters finds that the intent of Bill No. 54 will update the current law regulating the stamping of eggs. Guam is the only domestic jurisdiction that requires the individual stamping of eggs. This requirement is costly, especially if the eggs are imported. The cost is burdened by the consumers of imported eggs. This measure will change the administrative rules requirement of the labeling of the origin of the egg on each individual egg and to allow for the stamping of a carton of twelve eggs or less. This lessens the expense of packaging, thereby reducing the cost on consumers.

Accordingly, the Committee on General and Omnibus Matters to which Bill No. 54 (EC) was referred does hereby submit its findings and recommendations to I Mina' Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan **TO DO PASS BILL NO. 54 (EC)**, "An Act To Amend Subsection 40120(f)(3) Of Chapter 40 Of Title 10 Of The Guam Code Annotated; To Add §11106(d) And To Amend §11107 Of Chapter 11, Division 2 Of Title 8 Of The Guam Administrative Rules And Regulations Relative To Reducing The Price Of Eggs By Removing The Individual Egg Stamping Requirement Of Imported Eggs That Meet Local And United States Department Of Agriculture Inspection Requirements."

Testimony of Non-opposition for Bill No. 54

March 18, 2005

Hafa Adai and Good Morning to Mr. Speaker and the Members of the Committee. My name is Tom Nadeau, I am the Administrator with the Division of Environmental Health of the Department of Public Health and Social Services. On behalf of the Department and its Director, Mr. PeterJohn Camacho, I would like to provide testimony for our non-opposition to Bill No. 54.


The Department has read the content of Bill 54 and we have no objection to the amendment of §40120(f)(3) of Chapter 40 of Title 10 GCA. We will however refrain from commenting on the other provisions of Bill 54 since we believe that the Department of Agriculture is the appropriate agency that can best determine the consequences, if any, the bill will have on their operation and interest. Instead, our Department requests that Bill 54 be expanded to amend §21101(h) of Chapter 21 of Title 10 GCA.

Under the existing language of §21101(h), a Sanitary Permit is not required of any business or person that sells eggs. Such exemption was adopted over twenty years ago when food regulators incorrectly believed that intact shell eggs were free of dangerous microorganisms. However, we now know that pathogenic bacteria, *Salmonella enteritidis*, can be passed from the egg-laying hen to the egg through transovarian transmission.


Salmonella enteritidis, or SE, is a bacterium that causes the disease salmonellosis, which can cause fever, severe abdominal cramping, and diarrhea beginning 12-72 hours after the consumption of contaminated food. While most recover within 4 to 7 days, some will require hospitalization. For this reason, shell eggs must be treated like any other potentially hazardous foods that require proper refrigeration for storage and heating before consumption.

With the attached request for amendment to §21101(h) of Chapter 21 of Title 10 GCA, our Department can compel certain vendors to obtain Sanitary Permits and require them meet the safe handling and storage guidelines for shelled eggs.

Thank you and Si Yu'us Ma'ase for granting the Department and I the opportunity to present this testimony.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that much
3 legislation has been enacted to regulate the sale of shell eggs. The laws apply
4 to the edibility of the product and to its quality and grade. Both Federal and
5 State laws are applicable to eggs, but practically most of those pertaining to
6 grading have been enacted by the States.

1 The Egg Products Inspection Act (EPIA)(United States Public Law 91-
2 597), which became law in 1970, provides for the uniformity of standards and
3 grades. The Act states: "For eggs which have moved or are moving in
4 interstate or foreign commerce, no State or local jurisdiction may require the
5 use of standards of quality, condition, weight, quantity, or grade which are in
6 addition to or different from the official Federal standards." This has
7 prompted States with egg laws in which the standards and grades differ
8 somewhat from the official Federal standards and grades to amend their laws
9 to comply with the Federal standards. A provision on labeling prohibits
10 States from requiring labeling on eggs from other areas to indicate the State or
11 other geographic area of production or origin. This provision does not apply
12 to Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Guam or the Virgin Islands. However, Guam
13 is the only U.S. jurisdiction that requires individual egg stamp labeling.

14 Guam's administrative rules require that the origin of the eggs must be
15 stamped on each egg. As the only U.S. domestic jurisdiction with this
16 requirement, egg producers apply an added cost which inevitably is borne by
17 the consumers of Guam. As much as ten percent (10%) of the freight on board

1 (FOB) cost is added to the packaged product cost. The existing stamping
2 requirement has no added benefit for the consumers of Guam. The Federal
3 Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, and the regulations for its enforcement, apply
4 to all food products in interstate commerce, including shell eggs. This act is
5 designed to prevent the shipment of adulterated and misbranded foods.
6 Additionally, the Federal Trade Commission has responsibility for regulating
7 the business practices engaged in by firms marketing eggs in interstate or
8 foreign commerce. Therefore, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that the removal of
9 Guam's egg stamping policies will benefit the people of Guam by reducing
10 the cost of imported egg products.

11 **Section 2.** Subsection 11106(d) is hereby added to Chapter 11, Division
12 2 of Title 8 of the Guam Administrative Rules and Regulations to read:

7 daily products and ice cream, and such other food, drug and

10 clearly designated expiration date on each package offered for
