NUMBER 48/PERMEN-KP/2014

CONCERNING

FISHING LOG BOOKS

BY THE GRACE OF GOD ALMIGHTY

THE MINISTER OF MARINE AFFAIRS AND FISHERIES,

- Considering : a. that the implementation of fishing log books as stipulated in the Minister of Marine Affairs and Fisheries' Regulation Number PER.18/MEN/2010 concerning Fishing Log Books have not been fully able to meet the needs of data and information in the management of fish resources;
- b. that based on the consideration referred to in clause a, there is a need to stipulate a Regulation of the Minister of Marine Affairs and Fisheries concerning Fishing Log Books;
- Bearing in mind : 1. Law Number 5 of 1983 on the Indonesian Exclusive Economic Zone (State Gazette of the Republic of Indonesia Year 1983 Number 44, Supplement of the State Gazette of the Republic of Indonesia Number 3260);

HAS RESOLVED:

To promulgate : A REGULATION OF THE MINISTER OF MARINE AFFAIRS AND FISHERIES CONCERNING FISHING LOG BOOKS.

CHAPTER I GENERAL PROVISION

First Part Definitions

Article 1

In this Ministerial Regulation, what is referred to as:

1. Fisheries is all activities relating to the management and utilization of fish resources and its environment starting from preproduction, production, processing up to marketing carried out over a fishery business system.
2. Fish is any kind of organisms that for all or part of their life cycle lives in a water environment.
3. Fishing is any activity to obtain fish in waters that are not part of a Marine Protected Area, by any means or using any tools, including activities that use a vessel for loading, transporting, storing, freezing, handling, processing, and/or preserving fish.
4. A Fishing vessel is a ship, boat or other floating device used for fishing, supporting fishing operations, fish farming, fish transportation, fish processing, fisheries training, and fishery exploratory research.
5. A fishing license, hereinafter referred to as SIPI (*Surat Izin Penangkapan Ikan*), is a written permission that must be owned by every fishing vessel to catch fish, and is an integral part of a fishery business license hereinafter referred to as SIUP (*Surat Izin Usaha Perikanan*).
6. A fishing port is place that consists of land and surrounding waters with certain limits as place for the activities of government and fisheries business system that is used for fishing vessels to moor, berth, load and unload fish and/or replenish supplies, and that is equipped with shipping safety equipment and fisheries support facilities.
7. A skipper is one of the crew members with the highest leadership on board of the vessel and has the authority and responsibility in accordance with provisions of the legislation.
8. Fishing Log book is a daily record written by the skipper on fishing activities and daily operations of fishing vessels.
9. Fishing log book Information System is one of fisheries data processing system used in the verification process, data entry, data validation, data analysis, and conclusions of fishing log book using equipment that has been determined.
10. Minister is the minister who handles government affairs in the field of fisheries.

11. Director General is the Director General of Capture Fisheries.
12. Head of Department is the department head of a province or regency / municipality responsible for fisheries-related matters.

Second Part Scope

Article 2

This Ministerial Regulation applies to:

- a. Every Indonesian-flagged fishing vessels measuring above 5 GT operating in WPPNRI; and
- b. Every Indonesian-flagged fishing vessels operating on the high seas.

Article 3

Fishing log books constitute one of the information on catches in the fishing management system.

CHAPTER II TYPES OF FISHING LOG BOOKS

Article 4

- (1) Fishing log books are arranged by types of fishing gear.
- (2) Fishing log books referred to in clause (1), consist of:
 - a. log book for tuna longline and hand line fishing gears;
 - b. log book for large pelagic purse seines, pole&lines, mechanical pole&lines and trolling lanes fishing gears; and
 - c. log book other types of fishing gear in accordance with the provisions of the legislation.
- (3) Fishing log books referred to in clause (2), contain information about:
 - a. fishing vessel data;
 - b. fishing gears data;
 - c. fishing operation data; dan
 - d. catches data.
- (4) The form, format and procedures for filling Fishing log books referred to in clause (2), are listed in Annex I, Annex II, and Annex III that are an integral part of this Ministerial Regulation.

CHAPTER III FISHING LOG BOOKS OBLIGATION

Article 5

- (1) Every fishing vessel that owns a SIPI and engage in fishing operations shall be equipped with a fishing log book.
- (2) Fishing log book referred to in clause (1) must be filled out on board the vessel and is the responsibility of the skipper.
- (3) Fishing log book, referred to in clause (2), entries shall be objective and up to date.

CHAPTER IV
MECHANISM FOR FISHING LOG BOOKS SUBMISSION AND REPORT

Article 6

- (1) Every skippers of fishing vessels shall submit the fishing logbook before landing catches to:
 - a. the fishing port's harbourmaster;
 - b. fishing log books officer for fishing ports without a harbourmaster; or
 - c. fishing log books officer for ports that are not fishing ports.
- (2) The landing of fish catches as referred to in article (1) is to be carried out at the port specified in the SIPI.

Article 7

- (1) After receiving a fishing log book, harbourmasters, as referred to in Article 6 clause (1) letter a, shall conduct an inspection, which includes:
 - a. conformity between fishing gears used to fish species caught; and
 - b. conformity between the time period of fishing operations with the number of catches.
- (2) If the result of the inspection referred to in clause (1) is satisfactory, the skipper may start unloading the fish catches.
- (3) If the result of the inspection referred to in clause (1) is less than satisfactory, the fishing port's harbourmaster shall request a clarification from the vessel's skipper.
- (4) If the skipper's clarification referred to in clause (3) is acceptable, the fish catches may be unloaded.
- (5) In case the result of the log book data inspection referred to in clause (2) is satisfactory and the skipper's clarification referred to in clause (4) can be accepted, the fishing port's harbourmaster shall task the Data Entry officer to enter the inspected log book data into the Fishing Log Books Information System.
- (6) Log book data that has been recorded into the Fishing Log Books Information System referred to in clause (5), shall then be verified by a Verifier to ensure the accuracy of the inputted data.
- (7) The results of the verification process referred to in clause (6), shall be submitted to the Head of Fishing Port to be reported to the Director General by an online method through the Fishing Log Books Information System.

Article 8

- (1) After receiving a fishing log book, fishing log books officers, as referred to in Article 6 clause (1) letter b, shall conduct an inspection, which includes:
 - a. conformity between fishing gears used to fish species caught; and
 - b. conformity between the time period of fishing operations with the number of catches.
- (2) If the result of the inspection referred to in clause (1) is satisfactory, the skipper may start unloading the fish catches.
- (3) If the result of the inspection referred to in clause (1) is less than satisfactory, the fishing log books officer shall report the inspection to the Head of the Fishing Port, who then shall request a clarification from the vessel's skipper.
- (4) If the skipper's clarification referred to in clause (3) is acceptable, the fish catches may be unloaded.

- (5) In case the result of the log book data inspection referred to in clause (2) is satisfactory and the skipper's clarification referred to in clause (4) can be accepted, the Head of Fishing Port shall task the Data Entry officer to enter the log book data into the Fishing Log Books Information System.
- (6) Log book data that has been recorded into the Fishing Log Books Information System referred to in clause (5), shall then be verified by a Verifier to ensure the accuracy of the inputted data.
- (7) The results of the verification process referred to in clause (6), shall be submitted to the Head of Fishing Port to be reported to the Director General by an online method through the Fishing Log Books Information System.

Article 9

- (1) After receiving a fishing log book, fishing log books officers, as referred to in Article 6 clause (1) letter c, shall conduct an inspection, which includes:
 - a. conformity between fishing gears used to fish species caught; and
 - b. conformity between the time period of fishing operations with the number of catches.
- (2) If the result of the inspection referred to in clause (1) is satisfactory, the skipper may start unloading the fish catches.
- (3) If the result of the inspection referred to in clause (1) is less than satisfactory, the fishing log books officers shall coordinate with the port's (that is not a fishing port) harbourmaster that the fish catches' unloading process cannot be conducted and report to the nearest Head of Fishing Port, who then shall request a clarification from the vessel's skipper.
- (4) If the skipper's clarification referred to in clause (3) is acceptable, the fish catches may be unloaded.
- (5) In case the result of the log book data inspection referred to in clause (2) is satisfactory and the skipper's clarification referred to in clause (4) can be accepted, the Head of Fishing Port shall task the Data Entry officer to enter the log book data into the Fishing Log Books Information System.
- (6) Log book data that has been recorded into the Fishing Log Books Information System referred to in clause (5), shall then be verified by a Verifier to ensure the accuracy of the inputted data.
- (7) The results of the verification process referred to in clause (6), shall be submitted to the nearest Head of Fishing Port to be reported to the Director General by an online method through the Fishing Log Books Information System.

Article 10

The skippers of fishing vessels operating on the high seas that land their fish catches at foreign harbours should send their fishing log books electronically no later than 48 (forty eight) hours after the landing of their fish catches to:

- a. The Head of Fishing Port stated in their SIPI; or
- b. The fishing log book officer for ports that are not fishing ports, as stated in their SIPI.

Article 11

- (1) The Head of Fishing Port, as referred to in Article 10 letter a, shall then task the Data Entry officer to enter the log book data into the Fishing Log Books Information System.
- (2) Log book data that has been recorded into the Fishing Log Books

Information System referred to in clause (1), shall then be verified by a Verifier to ensure the accuracy of the inputted data.

- (3) The results of the verification process referred to in clause (2), shall be submitted to the Head of Fishing Port to be reported to the Director General by an online method through the Fishing Log Books Information System.

Article 12

- (1) The fishing log book officer, as referred to in Article 10 letter b, shall then enter the log book data into the Fishing Log Books Information System.
- (2) Log book data that has been recorded into the Fishing Log Books Information System referred to in clause (1), shall then be verified by a Verifier to ensure the accuracy of the inputted data.
- (3) The results of the verification process referred to in clause (2), shall be submitted to the Head of Fishing Port to be reported to the Director General by an online method through the Fishing Log Books Information System.

Article 13

- (1) Based on the reports referred to in Article 7 through Article 12, The Director-General shall:
 - a. validate the the fishing logbook data to be analyzed to confirm its authenticity;
 - b. analyze the validated fishing log book data namely by data recapitulation, processing, as well as analysis; and
 - c. draw conclusions from the results of the fishing log book data analysis.
- (2) Based on the conclusions referred to in clause (1) letter c, the Director General shall submit a report to the Minister every six (6) months as a material consideration for fisheries management policies.

Article 14

The Directorate General, Heads of Fishing Ports, harbourmasters, Fishing Log Books Officers, Data Entry Officers, and Verifiers must guarantee the confidentiality of the fishing log books data.

CHAPTER V DEVELOPMENT

Article 15

- (1) The development of fishing log books are to be carried out by the Director General, governors, and regents/mayors in accordance with their respected authorities.
- (2) The development referred to in clause (1), are targeted for the Heads of Fishing Ports, harbourmasters at fishing ports, Data Entry Officers, Verifiers, Fishing Log Books Officers, and skippers.
- (3) The development as referred to in clause (2) is to be carried out through:
 - a. socialization;
 - b. training;
 - c. guidance; and/or
 - d. counseling.

CHAPTER VI SANCTIONS

Article 16

- (1) Any fishing vessel's skippers who do not submit their fishing log book as referred to in Article 6, will not be issued a Sailing Approval Letter (SPB) by harbourmasters.
- (2) The Head of Fishing Ports shall submit a report to the Director General about fishing vessels that do not submit a log book and are denied a SPB referred to in clause (1).
- (3) The information referred to in clause (2) is material consideration for the Director General to issue administrative sanctions.
- (4) The administrative sanction referred to in clause (3) is in the form of the vessel's SIPI being suspended for a maximum period of 1 (one) month.
- (5) In the event that the skipper has fulfilled his/her obligations before the expiry date of the SIPI suspension referred to in clause (4), the SIPI suspension sanction will be lifted by the licensor.
- (6) In the event that the expiry date of the SIPI sanction, as referred to in clause (4), expires and the skipper has still not submitted the fishing log book, they will be subject to administrative sanctions such as SIPI revocation.

Article 17

- (1) In the event a fishing log book, submitted by a fishing vessel's skipper, do not pass the inspection referred to in Article 7 clause (3) and the clarification is not acceptable, the fishing port's harbourmaster shall report it to the Head of the Fishing Port.
- (2) Based on the report referred to in clause (1), the Head of the Fishing Port shall forward it to the Director General for consideration in the provision of administrative sanctions.
- (3) In the event a fishing log book, submitted by a fishing vessel's skipper, do not pass the inspection referred to in Article 8 clause (3) or Article 9 clause (3) and the clarification is not acceptable, the Head of the Fishing Port shall forward it to the Director General for consideration in the provision of administrative sanctions.

Article 18

- (1) The administrative sanction referred to in Article 17 clause (2) and (3) is in the form of the vessel's SIPI being suspended for a maximum period of 1 (one) month.
- (2) In the event that the skipper has fulfilled his/her obligations before the expiry date of the SIPI suspension referred to in clause (1), the SIPI suspension sanction will be lifted.
- (3) In the event that the expiry date of the SIPI sanction, as referred to in clause (1), expires and the skipper has still not fulfilled his/her obligation, they will be subject to administrative sanctions such as SIPI revocation.

CHAPTER VII MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Article 19

Fishing log book officers and verifiers stationed at ports that are not fishing ports are set by:

- a. The Director General upon the recommendation of the nearest Head of Fishing Port for Central UPT fishing ports;
- b. Heads of Department for Local UPT fishing ports;

Article 20

For fishing ports or ports (that are not fishing ports) that do not have internet access, the delivery of verification results and data entry shall be reported to the Director General electronically or manually.

Article 21

Skippers of fishing vessels or fish transport vessels that receive transshipment from other fishing vessels shall submit a sheet copy of the other fishing vessel's log book as well as a transshipment declaration.

CHAPTER VIII CLOSING PROVISIONS

Article 22

At the time this Ministerial Regulation comes into effect, the Regulation of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries No. PER.18/MEN/2010 on Fishing Log books, shall be revoked and declared invalid.

Article 23

This Ministerial Regulation shall come into effect on the date of its promulgation.

For public cognizance, this Ministerial Regulation shall be promulgated in the State Gazette of the Republic of Indonesia.



FILLING OUT PROCEDURES

Log book sheets must be completed in full according to fishing gears using a pencil or ballpoint pen with black ink with 4 (four) copies: the white-coloured form to be submitted to fishing port officers or appointed officers at the vessel's landing location; the red-coloured form to be kept on board the ship/ by the company; the blue-coloured form to be given to the skipper; and the yellow-coloured form for transshipment.

- (1) PAGE__ OUT OF__
The current page number out of the total page number of the log book. Filled out for every fishing operation (trip).
- (2) VESSEL NAME
Name of the vessel used to carry out fishing operations.
- (3) COMPANY NAME
Name of company that operates the fishing vessel.
- (4) SIPI NUMBER
SIPI number used for carrying out fishing operations.
- (5) FISHING VESSEL MONITORING SYSTEM TRANSMITTER
The ID number of the Fishing Vessel Monitoring System transmitter used in conducting fishing operations.
- (6) YEAR
Year while performing fishing operation (trip).
- (7) TRIP NO.:THIS YEAR
Stating the number of trips this year.
- (8) FISHING GEAR TYPE/CODE
LID-RT for tuna longline, and LHP-PU for hand line

- (9) **GT (GROSS TONNAGE)**
Gross tonnage of the vessel used to carry out fishing operations (in accordance with vessel's gross deed).
- (10) **LENGTH OVERALL/LOA**
The total length of the ship used to carry out fishing operations, measured in meters.
- (11) **HP (HORSEPOWER)**
Strength/power of the primary engine, measured in horsepower (HP), of the main engine used by the vessel when conducting fishing operations.
- (12) **CALL SIGN**
Vessel's radio call sign.
- (13) **PORT OF DEPARTURE**
The port where the vessel departs from to conduct fishing operations.
- (14) **DEPARTURE DATE**
Date, month and year of departure from the port to the fishing ground location.
- (15) **TONNAGE PLATE NUMBER**
Number of vessel's plate listed on the vessel's gross deed.
- (16) **WNI CREW**
Number of Indonesian crew.
- (17) **WNA CREW**
Number of foreign crew.
- (18) **FISHERY MANAGEMENT ZONE OF THE REPUBLIC OF INDONESIA (WPP-NRI)**
Must be filled out in accordance with the fishing area code number:
571 - The waters of Strait of Malacca and Andaman Sea
572 - The waters of Indian Ocean west of Sumatra and Sunda Strait

- 573 - The waters of Indian Ocean stretching from south of Java Island to south of Nusa Tenggara, Savu Sea, and the western part of Timor Sea
- 711 - The waters of Karimata Strait, Natuna Sea, and part of South China Sea
- 712 - The waters of Java Sea
- 713 - The waters of Makassar Strait, Gulf of Boni, Flores Sea, and Bali Sea
- 714 - The waters of Gulf of Tolo and Banda Sea
- 715 - The waters of Gulf of Tomini, Molucca Sea, Halmahera Sea, Ceram Sea, and Gulf of Berau
- 716 - The waters of Celebes Sea and north of Halmahera Island
- 717 - The waters of Cenderawasih Bay and Pacific Ocean

- (19) FISHING GROUND AREA (DPI)
Name of the waters where fishing operation take place, including when on the high seas.
- (20) PORT OF LANDING
The port where the vessel land its fish catches.
- (21) ARRIVAL DATE
Date, month, and year of arrival at the port after the completion of fishing operations.
- (22) ACTIVITY DATE
Start date of activities.
- (23) ACTIVITY CODE
The activities code (written numerically), as follows:
1. Setting, only for tuna longline.
 2. Fishing only using hand line.
 3. Layover (no fishing activities).
 4. transshipment of catches to another vessel at sea.
 5. At port.*
- * Activities carried out at port is to be written in the "SKIPPER'S NOTE" column.

- (24) **ACTIVITIES LOCATION**
Position of the fishing vessel in accordance with the activity code, by including latitude and longitude.
- (25) **SETTING START TIME**
Local time (hours) when the tuna longline start to be set at sea or when the hand lines start to operate.
- (26) **HOOK TOTAL**
Total number of hooks used in conducting fishing operations.
- (27) **DISTANCE BETWEEN HOOKS**
Only to be filled out by tuna longline vessels. Distance between hooks used.
- (28) **FISH CATCH COMPOSITION**
All kinds of fish catches -albacore, yellowfin tuna, bigeye tuna, bluefin tuna, swordfish (Meka), striped marlin, blue marlin, and / or black marlin—must be recorded in accordance with fish type, both the amount and weight (kg). If the column available space run out then continue on to the next log book sheet.
- (29) **ECOLOGICALLY-RELATED SPECIES**
Ecologically-related species are other animals that live together with the target main catch to be recorded in accordance with the type and quantity of animals.
- (30) **OTHER FISH**
Other types of fish caught that differ from the 8 targeted fish types mentioned in the "FISH CATCH COMPOSITION" column.
- (31) **TOTAL CATCH ON THIS PAGE**
Represents the total number of catches of each type on each page, recorded by the total amount and weight (kg).
- (32) **TOTAL CATCH**
Represents the total number of catches of every type in the entire period of fishing operations, recorded by the total amount and weight (kg).
- (33) ...

- (33) **SKIPPER'S NOTE**
Is a place for important notes to be submitted to the appropriate authorities and may be used as a follow-up.
- (34) **SKIPPER'S NAME AND SIGNATURE**
Name and signature of the vessel's skipper responsible for the fishing log book.
- (35) **OFFICER'S NAME AND SIGNATURE**
Name and signature of the fishing log book officer as assurance that the information in the log book is correct and complete.
- (36) **DATE OF SUBMISSION**
The date when the fishing log book sheet was submitted to the authorities at port.

FILLING OUT PROCEDURES

Log book sheets must be completed in full according to fishing gears using a pencil or ballpoint pen with black ink with 4 (four) copies: the white-coloured form to be submitted to fishing port officers or appointed officers at the vessel's landing location; the red-coloured form to be kept on board the ship/ by the company; the blue-coloured form to be given to the skipper; and the yellow-coloured form for transshipment.

The current page number out of the total page number of the log book. Filled out for every fishing operation (trip).
