REGULATIONS SURVIVING IN TERMS OF

**Regulations for the Control of African Virus
Disease of Pigs (African Swine Fever)**

Government Notice 129 of 1960

(OG 2257)

came into force on date of publication: 15 June 1960

The Regulations for the Control of African Virus Disease of Pigs (African Swine Fever) were originally made in terms of section 27(4) of the Animal Diseases and Parasites Ordinance 34 of 1959, which was then repealed by the Animal Diseases and Parasites Amendment Act 9 of 1973, which was subsequently repealed by the Animal Health Act 1 of 2011. Pursuant to section 37(2) of the Animal Health Act 1 of 2011, the Regulations for the Control of African Virus Disease of Pigs (African Swine Fever) are deemed to have been made under that Act.

ARRANGEMENT OF REGULATIONS

[These regulations do not have headings.]

1. No owner or occupier of any land situated within the area defined in the Schedule hereto shall keep or permit to be kept, any pig on such land unless such pig is confined in a camp, sty, pen or run.

2. Any such camp, sty, pen or run shall be constructed of two pig-proof walls or fences and gates at least three feet apart. Drainage shall be provided in such a fashion that no urine or faeces voided outside the double enclosure will run or be washed into such camp, sty, pen or run.

3. No owner or occupier of such land shall move, cause or permit to be moved any pig, pig carcase or the uncooked portions thereof, including ham, bacon and pork sausages, or pig hair or manure out of the area defined in the Schedule hereto without the authority of a permit issued by a State Veterinarian, or otherwise than in accordance with the conditions specified in such permit.

SCHEDULE

The Magisterial districts of Grootfontein, Tsumeb, Otjiwarongo, Outjo, Omaruru, Karibib, Okahandja, Windhoek, Gobabis and Rehoboth.
