Pursuant to section 89 of the Fisheries Act 1983, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

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Regulations

- 1 Title and commencement

(1) These regulations may be cited as the Fisheries (Challenger Area Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986.

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 14th day after the date of their notification in the Gazette.

## 2 Application

These regulations apply in respect of all persons taking or possessing any fish to which these regulations relate, other than commercial fishers taking or possessing fish under a permit, licence, quota, or other authorisation issued or granted under the Act or any regulations made under the Act.

### 2A Interpretation

In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires,---

Act means the Fisheries Act 1983 or the Fisheries Act 1996

blue cod means a fish of the species *Parapercis colias*

blue moki means a fish of the species *Latridopsis ciliaris*

butterfish means a fish of the species *Odax pullus* or *Odax cyanoallix*

Challenger (east) area---

(a) means all that area of New Zealand fisheries waters enclosed by a line commencing at Farewell Spit light (approximately 42°32.9'S and approximately 173°00.6'E); then proceeding north along this line of longitude to a point on the boundary of Fisheries Management Area 7 (approximately 39°38'S and approximately 173°00.6'E); then proceeding in a generally south-easterly direction directly to a point 40°32.0'S and 174°20.0'E; then proceeding in a generally southerly direction to the Brothers Island light (approximately 41°06.2'S and approximately 174°26.5'E); then proceeding in a generally southerly direction directly to a point 42°10.0'S and 174°42.0'E; then proceeding west along the 42°10.0'S line of latitude to the mean high-water mark of the South Island near Clarence Point (approximately longitude 173°56.5'E); then proceeding along the mean high-water mark of the South Island in generally northerly, westerly, and south-westerly directions to the point of commencement; but

(b) does not include the Marlborough Sounds Area

Challenger fisheries management area means all that area of New Zealand fisheries waters enclosed by a line commencing at Awarua Point on the west coast of the South Island (at 44°16'S and 168°03'E); then proceeding due west along latitude 44°16'S to the outer limits of the exclusive economic zone to a point at 44°16'S and 162°13'E; then proceeding in a generally north-easterly direction along the outer limits of the exclusive economic zone to a point at 37°44'S and 169°56'E; then proceeding in a straight line to a point at 40°32'S and 174°20'E; then proceeding in a straight line to a point at 42°10'S and 174°42'E; then proceeding due west along latitude 42°10'S to Clarence Point on the east coast of the South Island (at 42°10'S and 173°56'E); then proceeding in a generally northerly, westerly, and south-westerly direction along the mean high-water mark of the coast of the South Island to the point of commencement

dredge oyster means a mollusc known as *Tiostrea chilensis* (formerly known as *Ostrea lutaria*)

elephant fish means a fish of the species *Callorhynchus milii*

flatfish means a fish of the species---

(a) sand flounder ("dab", "white", or "square" flounder) (*Rhombosolea plebeia*); or

(b) lemon sole (*Pelotretis flavilatus*); or

(c) New Zealand sole (*Peltorhampus novaezeelandiae*); or

(d) flounder ("yellow belly") (*Rhombosolea leporina*); or

(e) black flounder (*Rhombosolea retiaria*); or

(f) greenblack flounder (*Rhombosolea tapirina*); or

(g) brill (*Colistium guntheri*); or

(h) turbot (*Colistium nudipinnis*)

grey mullet means a fish of the species *Mugil cephalus*

hapuku/bass means a fish of the species *Polyprion oxygeneios* or *Polyprion moene*

John dory means a fish of the species *Zeus faber*

kahawai means a fish of the species *Arripis trutta*

kingfish means a fish of the species *Seriola lalandi*

Marlborough Sounds area means all those waters lying inside a line commencing at West Head of Tory Channel on the north coast of the South Island (at 41°12.90'S and 174°18.90'E), then proceeding in a straight line to East Head of Tory Channel (at 41°12.80'S and 174°19.40'E), then proceeding in a generally northerly direction along the mean high water mark to Cape Koamaru at 41°05.50'S and 174°23'E), then proceeding in a straight line to Cape Jackson at 40°59.80'S and 174°18.70'E), then proceeding in a straight line to the northernmost point of Stephens Island (at 40°39.90'S and 174°00'E), then proceeding down the eastern side of Stephens Island in a south-westerly direction along the mean high water mark, then proceeding in a southwesterly direction along the mean high water mark to the southernmost point of Stephens Island (at 40°40.60'S and 173°59.40'E), then proceeding in a straight line to Cape Stephens at 40°41.60'S and 173°57.40'E, then proceeding in a generally southerly direction along the mean high water mark along the eastern side of D'Urville Island to Reef Point at French Pass (at 40°55.20'S and 173°50.20'E), then proceeding in a straight line to Channel Point light (at 40°55.60'S and 173°50.10'E)

Pacific oyster means the mollusc *Crassostrea gigas*

red cod means a fish of the species *Pseudophycis bacchus*

red gurnard means a fish of the species *Chelidonichthys kumu*

red moki means a fish of the species *Cheilodactylus spectabilis*

rig means a fish of the species *Mustelus lenticulatus*

school shark means a fish of the species *Galeorhinus australis*

set net includes a gill net or any other sort of net that acts by enmeshing, entrapping, or entangling any fish

snapper means a fish of the species *Chrysophrys auratus*

tarakihi means a fish of the species *Nemadactylus macropterus*

trevally means a fish of the species *Caranx georgianus*.

## 2B Maximum daily number of fish

(1) Subclause (2) applies to fish of the following species:

Blue cod            Kahawai

Blue moki           Red cod

Bluenose        Red gurnard

Butterfish     Red moki

Elephant fish   Rig

Flatfish        School shark

Grey mullet    Tarakihi

John dory       Trevally.

(2) No person may, on any day,---

(a) take from within the Challenger fishery management area more than 20 fish to which this subclause applies; or

(b) possess more than 20 such fish in that area; or

(c) possess more than 20 such fish taken from within that area.

(3) No person may, on any day,---

(a) take more than 3 blue cod from within the combined Challenger (east) area and Marlborough Sounds area; or

(b) possess more than 3 blue cod taken from within that combined area.

(3A) Revoked.

(4) No person may, on any day,---

(a) take from within the Challenger fishery management area more than 10 snapper; or

(b) possess more than 10 snapper in that area; or

(c) possess more than 10 snapper taken from within that area.

(5) No person may, on any day,---

(a) take from within the Marlborough Sounds area more than 3 snapper; or

(b) possess more than 3 snapper in that area; or

(c) possess more than 3 snapper taken from within that area.

(6) No person may, on any day,---

(a) take from within the Challenger fishery management area a total quantity of hapuku/bass and kingfish exceeding 5; or

(b) possess a total quantity of hapuku/bass and kingfish exceeding 5 in that area; or

(c) possess a total quantity of hapuku/bass and kingfish exceeding 5 taken from within that area.

(7) No person may, on any day,---

(a) take from within the Challenger fishery management area more than 3 kingfish; or

(b) possess more than 3 kingfish in that area; or

(c) possess more than 3 kingfish taken from within that area.

(8) A person contravenes this subclause if the person, on any day, takes or possesses more than the daily limit of fish (as specified in this regulation), but not more than 3 times the daily limit.

(9) A person contravenes this subclause if the person, on any day, takes or possesses more than 3 times the daily limit of fish (as specified in this regulation).

## 2C Minimum size for blue cod in Marlborough Sounds area

Notwithstanding regulation 6 of the Fisheries (Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986 (SR 1986/221), no person shall take from or possess in the Marlborough Sounds area any blue cod that is less than 30 cm in length.

## 2D Minimum size for blue cod in Challenger (east) area

Despite regulation 6 of the Fisheries (Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986, no person may take from or possess in the Challenger (east) area any blue cod that is less than 30 cm in length.

## 3 Maximum daily blue cod limit in Marlborough Sounds area

Revoked.

## 3A Scallops

(1) Notwithstanding regulation 19 of the Fisheries (Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986 (SR 1986/221) or any other regulations made pursuant to the Fisheries Act 1983 or the Fisheries Act 1996 relating to maximum daily catches, any person may take on any 1 day up to 50 scallops (*Pecten novaezelandiae*) from the Challenger fisheries management area.

(1A) A person contravenes this subclause if the person, on any day, takes or possesses more than the number of scallops permitted under subclause (1), but not more than 3 times that number.

(1B) A person contravenes this subclause if the person, on any day, takes or possesses more than 3 times the number of scallops permitted under subclause (1).

(2) No person shall---

(a) take from the Challenger fisheries management area any scallop whose shell, whether entire, chipped, or broken, is less than 90 mm in length; or

(b) be in possession of any scallop taken from the Challenger fisheries management area whose shell, whether entire, chipped, or broken, is less than 90 mm in length.

(3) For the purposes of subclause (1), the length of the shell of a scallop is its greatest diameter.

### 3B Minimum set net mesh size

Notwithstanding regulation 6 of the Fisheries (Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986, the mesh size of any set net used or possessed by any person in the Challenger fishery management area shall not be less than the appropriate size specified in the following table:

### 4 Double Cove finfishing restrictions

No person shall take any finfish from Double Cove, being those waters of Queen Charlotte Sound inside a line from Nohokouau Point (at 41°14.4'S and 174°00.5'E) to the southernmost point of the peninsula (at 41°14.5'S and 174°01.4'E) lying between Double Cove and Torea Bay.

#### 4A Set net prohibition

(1) Except as provided for in subclause (2), no person shall use or possess a set net having a mesh size of or greater than 100 mm in the following waters:

(a) inner Queen Charlotte Sound: the waters inside a line running from Dieffenbach Point (40°14.0'S and 174°08.70'E) to West Head Point (41°13.0'S and 174°08.60'E):

(b) Pelorus Sound: the waters inside a line running from Cregoe Point (41°03.20'S and 173°49.90'E) to Camel Point (41°02.10'S and 173°48.60'E) to Sheep Point (41°01.20'S and 173°48.80'E) and inside a line running from Tawero

Point (41o03.80'S and 173o57.0'E) to Opani-aputa Point (41o04.70'S and 173o58.50'E):

(c) Croiselles Harbour: the waters inside a line running from Cape Soucis (41o03.20'S and 173o35.60'E) to the outermost point of Motuanauru Island (41o02.50'S and 173o38.40'E) to the outermost point of Otuhaereroa Island (41o02.30'S and 173o39.60'E) to Kokaho Point (41o02.30'S and 173o40.30'E).

(2) Nothing in subclause (1) applies to any set net having---

(a) a mesh size not less than 100 mm; and

(b) a total height not exceeding 9 meshes; and

(c) its entire length in direct contact with the seabed.

(3) Without limiting subclause (1), no person shall use or possess a set net in the waters of Keneperu Sound---

(a) during the period commencing on the day on which this subclause comes into force and ending with the close of 31 March 1997; or

(b) during any period, after 31 March 1997, commencing on 1 October in any year and ending with the close of 31 March in the next year.

(4) For the purposes of subclause (3), the waters of Keneperu Sound are the waters lying inside a straight line running from Koutuwai Point (at approximately 41o12.65'S and 173o 52.30'E) to an unnamed point at the southern entrance to Keneperu Sound (at approximately 41o13.30'S and 173o51.70'E).

4B Hook limit in Marlborough Sounds

#### 4C Pacific oyster

Notwithstanding anything in regulation 19(1) or regulation 23(2) of the Fisheries (Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986 (SR 1986/221), any person may take Pacific oysters from the waters of the Challenger fishery management area at any time on any day.

#### 4D Dredge oysters

Regulation 23(2) of the Fisheries (Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986 shall not apply to prohibit the taking of dredge oysters from the Challenger fisheries management area.

#### 4E Pelorus Sound longlining restrictions

(1) No person shall use or possess any line (other than a rod and reel line or a hand line) in the waters of Pelorus Sound.

(2) For the purposes of this regulation, the waters of Pelorus Sound are the waters lying inside a straight line running from Tawero Point (at approximately 41°03.80'S and 173°48.80'E) to Opani-aputa Point (at approximately 41°04.70'S and 173°58.50'E).

Regulation 4E: inserted, on 7 November 1996, by regulation 4 of the Fisheries (Challenger Area Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986, Amendment No 5 (SR 1996/312).

#### 5 Offences and penalties

(1) A person commits an offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$10,000 if the person contravenes, or fails to comply with, any of regulations 2B(8), 2C, 3A(1A), (2)(a) and (b), 3B, 4, 4A, or 4E.

(2) A person commits a serious non-commercial offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$20,000 if the person contravenes, or fails to comply with, regulation 2B(9) or 3A(1B).

(3) It is a defence to a charge of possessing more than the specified maximum daily number of any fish in contravention of these regulations if the defendant satisfies the court that the number of fish possessed in excess of the relevant specified daily number were not taken in breach of the regulations.

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- 2 Status of reprints
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## Notes

- 1 General

This is a reprint of the Fisheries (Challenger Area Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986. The reprint incorporates all the amendments to the Fisheries (Challenger Area Amateur Fishing) Regulations 1986 as at 21 October 2004, as specified in the list of amendments at the end of this reprint.

## 2 Status of reprints

Under section 29A of the Evidence Act 1908, reprints are presumed to correctly state, as at the date of the reprint, the law enacted by the principal enactment and by the amendments to that enactment. This presumption applies even though editorial changes authorised by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 have been made in the reprint. For an outline of editorial changes made in reprints, see below.

This presumption may be rebutted by producing the official volumes of statutes or statutory regulations in which the principal enactment and its amendments are contained.

## 3 How reprints are prepared

The following conventions are followed in the preparation of reprints generally, and they have been followed, where relevant, in the preparation of this reprint:

- o the enacting words have been omitted
- o provisions that have been repealed or revoked are omitted, but a note indicates the repealing enactment or revoking provision
- o footnotes are included to indicate where---
  - o words, phrases, or provisions have been inserted or substituted, the commencement date of the amendment, and the particular enactment responsible for the change
  - o references in a reprinted enactment to any repealed enactment have been replaced with a reference to any enactment that replaces, or corresponds to, the repealed enactment, in reliance on section 22(2) of the Interpretation Act 1999
  - o any term used in a reprinted enactment that has been deemed, by another enactment, to be read as if it were another term has been replaced by that other term
  - o references in a reprinted enactment to amounts in pounds, shillings, and pence have been replaced by a reference to the equivalent amount in decimal currency (dollars and cents), in reliance on section 7 of the Decimal Currency Act 1964
- o where the principal enactment has made a textual amendment to another enactment, and the amendment has been incorporated in a reprint of that other enactment, the text of the amendment is not reprinted in full in the reprint
- o where a provision of an amending enactment has made a textual amendment to the principal enactment, the provision of the amending enactment is not reprinted.

## 4 Changes made under section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989

Section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 authorises the making of editorial changes in a reprint so that, to the extent permitted, the format and style of the reprinted enactment is consistent with current legislative drafting practice. Changes that would change the effect of the legislation are not permitted.

A new format of legislation was introduced on 1 January 2000. Changes to legislative drafting style have also been made since 1997, and are ongoing. To the extent permitted by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, all legislation reprinted after 1 January 2000 is in the new format for legislation and reflects current legislative drafting practice.

In outline, the editorial changes made in reprints under the authority of section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 are as follows, and they have been followed, where relevant, in the preparation of this reprint:

- o unnecessary referential words (such as "of this section" and "of this Act") have been omitted
- o typeface and type size have been changed to accord with current drafting practice (Times Roman, generally in 11.5 point with 13.5 point leading)
- o the setting out of provisions has been changed to accord with current drafting practice. These changes include---
  - o changes to the indenting and layout of provisions
  - o the repositioning of section headings, so that the number and heading appear above the section
  - o the reformatting of definitions, so that the defined term appears in bold type, without quotation marks
  - o dates are expressed in a manner consistent with current drafting practice (eg, a date formerly expressed as "the 1st day of January 1999" is now expressed as "1 January 1999")
  - o the date of assent has been repositioned so that it appears on the front page of each Act
- o punctuation is consistent with current drafting practice (eg, colons are not used after definitions)
- o Parts numbered with roman numerals have been replaced with arabic numerals, and all cross-references changed accordingly
- o the case and appearance of letters and words have been changed to accord with current drafting practice
- o headings have been reformatted (eg, headings where each word formerly appeared with an initial capital letter followed by small capitals have been changed so that the heading appears in bold, with only the first word

(and any proper names) appearing with an initial capital)

- o letters appearing in small capitals in section and subsection references have been changed to capital letters (eg, "section 7a" is now expressed as "section 7A")

- o schedules have been renumbered (eg, Schedule 1 replaces First Schedule), and all cross-references changed accordingly

- o running heads (the information that appears at the top of each page) have been altered to accord with current drafting practice.

Two-column schedules of consequential amendments, and schedules of repeals, have been reformatted, and rearranged into alphabetical order (rather than chronological), to accord with current drafting practice.
