

Wildlife Sanctuary (Trio Islands) Order 1965
(SR 1965/185)

These regulations are administered in the Department of Internal Affairs

PURSUANT to the Wildlife Act 1953, I, Brigadier Sir Bernard Edward Fergusson, the Governor-General of New Zealand, hereby proclaim as follows:

1

- (1) This Proclamation may be cited as the Wildlife Sanctuary (Trio Islands) Order 1965.
(2) This Proclamation shall come into force on the day after the date of its notification in the Gazette.

- In this Proclamation, unless the context otherwise requires,—
The Act means the Wildlife Act 1953
Director-General means the Director-General of Conservation
Director-General: This definition was inserted, as from 1 April 1987, by section 65(3) Conservation Act 1987 (1987 No 65).
Sanctuary means the area described in the Schedule hereto
Secretary
[Revoked]
Secretary: this definition was revoked, as from 1 April 1987, by section 65(3) Conservation Act 1987 (1987 No 65).

- The area described in the Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be a wildlife sanctuary for the purposes of the Act, subject to the conditions specified in clauses 4 to 6 of this Proclamation.

- No person shall enter the sanctuary except:
 - (a) The Maori owners whose names are recorded as such in the records of the Maori Land Court;
 - (b) Rangers under the Act while in the lawful execution of their duty;
 - (c) Seafarers entering through stress of weather;
 - (d) Any other person authorised in writing by the Director-General.Regulation 4(d) was amended, as from 1 April 1987, by section 65(3) Conservation Act 1987 (1987 No 65) by substituting the words “Director-General” for the word “Secretary”.

- No person shall, except with the written authority of the Director-General,—
 - (a) Hunt or kill, take for any purpose, molest, capture, disturb, harry, or worry any living creature in the sanctuary:

Provided that the said Maori owners may during the months of April and May of each year hunt or kill the young of the New Zealand muttonbird, otherwise known as the sooty shearwater or oi or titi (*Puffinus griseus*), subject to such conditions as the Minister of Internal Affairs may impose in any notification issued under section 6 of the Act:

- (b) Take, destroy, or disturb the eggs or spawn of any living creature in the sanctuary:
- (c) Take for any purpose or interfere with vegetation of any description in the sanctuary:
- (d) Introduce or liberate in the sanctuary any living creature or the eggs or spawn of any living creature:
- (e) Introduce or plant in the sanctuary any vegetation of any description or the spores or seeds of any vegetation of any description:
- (f) Burn or clear by any means whatsoever any trees, shrubs, grasses, or other plant life on the sanctuary:
- (g) Camp in the sanctuary:
- (h) Light any fire or do anything likely to cause a fire on the sanctuary:
- (i) Take any firearms or explosives on to the sanctuary or use any firearms or explosives on the sanctuary:
- (j) Take or keep any domestic animal or domestic bird into or in the sanctuary.

Regulation 5 was amended, as from 1 April 1987, by section 65(3) Conservation Act 1987 (1987 No 65) by substituting the words "Director-General" for the word "Secretary".

- No person shall deposit rubbish or leave litter in the sanctuary.

- The Proclamation issued on the 12th day of July 1957¹ declaring land in the Nelson Land District to be a wildlife sanctuary is hereby revoked.

Schedule **Trio islands wildlife sanctuary**

ALL those areas of Maori land situated in the Nelson Land District, being part Rangitoto Block, situated in Block XIII, D'Urville Survey District, containing an area of approximately 80 acres, being all those islands, islets, reefs, and rocks situated within a circle having a radius of 1 1/2 miles from Trig Station T on Kurupongi Island and collectively known as the Trio or Te Kuku Islands; as shown on the plan marked IA 46/29/102, deposited in the Head Office, Department of Internal Affairs at Wellington, that circle being thereon edged red; together with the foreshore of those islands, islets, reefs, and rocks, being such parts of the bed of the sea as are covered and uncovered by the flow and ebb of the tide at ordinary spring tides.
